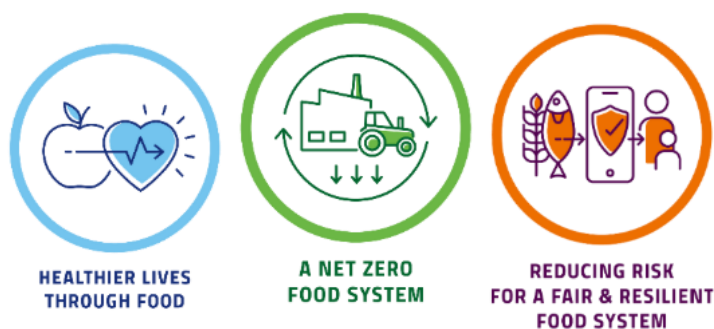

Objective and Scope	The goal of this call is to recruit qualified contributors to support the effective functioning and impact of the Resilient Agriculture Think and Do Tank. The selected contributors will strengthen the delivery of initiatives by leading and coordinating content development, supporting Steering Committee and Working Group activities, and ensuring structured collaboration across stakeholders.

1. Introduction

EIT Food is the world's largest food innovation community, creating connections right across the food system. Supported by the European Union (EU), we invest in projects, organisations and individuals which share our goals for a healthy and sustainable food system.

We have built a unique not-for-profit business to carry out transformative programmes in skills, education, entrepreneurship, start-up investment and communications. We deliver these programmes in partnership with our members to create a culture and build a community which sees the long-term value in the food innovation we fund.

EIT Food's Missions respond to major societal challenges within the food system. 2. Adding Implementing Participants to EIT Food's Think and Do Tanks

This EIT Food Request for Implementing Participants has the objective of recruiting participants tasked with implementing EIT Food's Think and Do Tanks.

2.1. Description of Activities

EIT Food is opening a targeted call exclusively for its partner organisations that are active members of the Resilient Agriculture Think and Do Tanks (TDT). The call is focused on coordination and content creation to strengthen collaboration within the TDT, ensure alignment across activities, and support the development of coherent, high-quality knowledge and communication outputs. Through this call, EIT Food aims to enable committed partners to play a central role in coordinating joint efforts, shaping shared narratives, and translating the TDT's strategic objectives into actionable content and outcomes, in close collaboration with EIT Food staff and TDT members.

This call is restricted to EIT Food partners because the role requires a deep understanding of EIT Food's mission, governance, and operational processes, as well as first-hand knowledge of the Think and Do Tank's objectives, activities, and ways of working. Active partners bring essential institutional knowledge, established working relationships, and familiarity with ongoing initiatives, which are critical for ensuring effective coordination, continuity, and strategic coherence across TDT activities.

Applicants must be official EIT Food partners, demonstrate active participation within the Resilient Agriculture Think and Do Tank, and have a proven track record of engagement, including attendance at relevant TDT meetings. The selected partner organisation is expected to actively contribute to the delivery of activities and participate in Steering Committee meetings and, where required, Working Group sessions.

Content creation:

The role includes responsibility for content creation, with a varying number of documents required each year per Think and Do Tank (maximum five reports annually). These outputs may vary in length (between 300 and 1,500 words, 1 to 5 pages, not including imagery) and can be produced for external publication or internal TDT use. The content may be based on qualitative and/or quantitative research, depending on the objectives and needs of the Think and Do Tank. The specific content creation outcomes will be defined throughout the year in collaboration with partners and EIT Food staff, based on evolving needs and strategic priorities of the TDT.

The partner should take full ownership of content creation while collaborating closely with EIT Food staff and other TDT members to ensure all outputs are delivered on time, meet the agreed standards, and are aligned with the Think and Do Tank's strategic priorities.

Key content outputs expected from the partner may include:

- Conduct foresight activities and trends mapping to identify emerging topics, challenges, and opportunities relevant to the TDT's strategic focus, as required.
- Create policy white papers and other strategic documents, as required.

- Contribute to project development by creating content for internal (EIT Food grants) or external funding applications (Philanthropic, Horizon Europe, Erasmus grants), if needed, in collaboration with the EIT Food fundraising team, TDT leadership team, and TDT members.
- Support in the development of a monthly newsletter to keep partners of the Resilient Agriculture TDT updated with relevant activities and developments.

Supporting responsibilities may include:

- Gather insights, feedback, and relevant data from partners and EIT Food staff to inform and strengthen policy papers, reports, and strategic outputs.
- Coordinate with partners to ensure their perspectives and expertise are accurately reflected in Think and Do Tank content outputs (for example, white papers, foresight studies, etc.) during TDT meetings, Steering Co meetings and bilateral conversations.
- Tailor messaging of agreed content deliverables for different audiences, including policymakers, academia, and the private sector, adapting the style and format to suit each audience.
- Disseminate insights and content outputs to relevant stakeholders, ensuring that key information reaches the intended audience effectively in collaboration with EIT Food staff and TDT partners.

Steering Committee meetings are held with the Presidents and Vice Presidents of the Think and Do Tanks (TDTs).

Think and Do Tank meetings refer to meetings involving all TDT members.

2.2. Key Performance Indicators (KPIs)

All **EIT Food funded** projects should achieve relevant Key Performance Indicators (KPIs). For the Resilient Agriculture Think and Do Tank, the main KPIs are:

Please note: At the end of the funding period, EIT Food requires specific structured data and documentation to verify the achievement of KPIs. Grantees must report their KPI achievements through the grant management tool and ensure that all required structured data and supporting evidence is submitted in accordance with the guidelines provided (see [EIT Food KPI Guidance Document](#) for details).

2.3. Deliverables and Milestones

Grant recipients must submit project deliverables. For this activity the deliverable include:

- The creation of a strategic document for the Resilient Agriculture Think and Do Tank (RA TDT), ranging from 4,500–5,500 words (1–10 pages, excluding imagery), for internal and/or external publication depending on RA TDT needs.

Deadline for submitting the deliverable: September 2027.

Grant recipients have obligations on communication, dissemination and visibility rules. Please see Article 17 of the [Model Grant Agreement](#) and EIT Food's [Brand Guidelines](#).

Grant recipients must adhere to [EIT Food Intellectual Property's \(IP\) Policy](#) which complies with the IP provisions outlined in Article 16 of the Horizon Europe [Model Grant Agreement](#). Intellectual property rights generated through this activity remain with the beneficiary of the grant.

3. Description of Role & Profile

3.1 Role

Through this call, EIT Food seeks to appoint a committed partner organisation to take on a central coordination and content creation role within the Resilient Agriculture Think and Do Tanks. The selected partner will act as a key enabler of collaboration, strategic alignment, and knowledge development, supporting the Think and Do Tank in translating its objectives into coherent, high-quality outputs and tangible outcomes.

The role is focused on strengthening coordination across Think and Do Tank activities, shaping shared narratives, and ensuring continuity and strategic coherence. It requires close collaboration with EIT Food staff, the Think and Do Tank leadership (President and Vice-Presidents), and the wider partner community.

The selected partner is expected to actively contribute to the delivery of activities, participate in Steering Committee meetings and Think and Do Tank meetings, and, where required, engage in Working Group sessions when needed.

3.2 Profile

EIT Food is seeking an established and highly engaged EIT Food partner organisation with a strong strategic, analytical, and coordination capacity, capable of supporting the Resilient Agriculture Think and Do Tank in delivering high-quality content and ensuring effective collaboration across its membership.

Applicants must be **official EIT Food partner organisations** and demonstrate **active and ongoing participation** in the relevant Think and Do Tank. This includes regular attendance at Think and Do Tank meetings and documented engagement in discussions, initiatives, or working groups. A strong understanding of EIT Food's mission, governance, strategic objectives, and operational processes is

essential, as the role requires close alignment with internal procedures and collaboration with EIT Food staff.

The ideal organisation will have a proven track record in **policy analysis, foresight activities, research, and/or strategic content development** related to food systems, agriculture, nutrition, sustainability, or closely related domains aligned with the focus of the Think and Do Tank (Resilient Agriculture). Experience in producing high-quality written outputs for diverse audiences—including policymakers, academia, industry, and multi-stakeholder partnerships—is a key requirement.

Applicants should demonstrate strong **coordination and facilitation capabilities**, including experience in managing multi-partner collaborations, supporting steering or advisory committees, and aligning diverse stakeholder perspectives toward shared objectives. The organisation should be comfortable operating in a complex, multi-actor environment and able to foster constructive dialogue and engagement across public, private, academic, and civil society stakeholders.

The organisation must have sufficient **internal capacity and expertise** to take ownership of assigned deliverables, manage timelines, and ensure consistent quality across outputs. This includes the ability to collect and synthesise qualitative and quantitative inputs from partners, translate evidence into clear and actionable messages, and adapt content to different formats and audiences.

Applicants should also demonstrate strong **communication and organisational skills**, including experience in preparing meeting materials, facilitating discussions, and maintaining shared knowledge repositories. Familiarity with collaborative digital tools (e.g. Microsoft Teams or equivalent platforms) is expected to ensure effective information sharing and continuity.

Overall, the selected organisation should be recognised as a trusted and proactive contributor within the Think and Do Tank, capable of providing strategic added value, strengthening collaboration, and supporting the delivery of impactful, coherent, and policy-relevant outcomes aligned with EIT Food's objectives.

4. Funding

The total budget for this call is 50.000 euros. Implementing participant recipients will receive a subgrant to fund their cost.

The project runs from September to September 2027. The maximum funding available for that period per application is 50.000 euros (lump sum).

There is a 6 million EUR limit per participants from Member States of the European Union (EU) and from [Horizon Europe Associate Countries](#) for the whole 3-year Grant Agreement. Legal entities from non- Horizon Europe Associate countries can participate in consortia but are limited to funding of 60 000 over 3 years for a Grant Agreement. This funding is implemented under GA 101269771. In those limits are included all the EIT Funding awarded to an organization across all the activities and prizes for the 3-year grant agreement.

The Subgrant is based on fixed lump sum and value for money. All costs, including co-funding, need to comply with Horizon Europe regulations regarding the eligibility of expenses. Please refer to Article 6 of the [Model Grant Agreement](#) and the [Annotated Model Grant Agreement](#).

Participants are not permitted to give a subgrant to another third party.

The total lump sum contribution will be disbursed in instalments. It is conditional upon the delivery of the project deliverables mentioned above. Each deliverable is associated with proportional cost allocation and deduction rate. In cases where deliverables are not completed or only partially fulfilled, a deduction will be applied up to the amount associated with the incomplete deliverable.

Deliverable:

▸ Allocated Value: €50,000 (100% of the lump sum)

- The creation of a strategic document for the Resilient Agriculture Think and Do Tank (RA TDT), ranging from 4,500–5,500 words (1–10 pages, excluding imagery), for internal and/or external publication depending on RA TDT needs.

Deadline for submitting the deliverable: September 2027.

The lump sum is intended to support a broad set of activities aligned with Horizon Europe and EIT Food priorities. It covers the following cost categories:

- **Personnel (up to €22.000):** partial salary costs for a dedicated coordination role responsible for ensuring the timely delivery of TDT activities.
- **Subcontracting (up to €14.375):** external experts to support professional content creation, graphic design, publication layout, and visual storytelling.
- **Travel (up to €1.500):** covers transport and lodging for two in-person meetings per year.
- **Other Goods & Services (up to €5.000):** includes costs for subscriptions, access to research databases, software licenses, and printing materials necessary for producing reports, foresight studies, and other strategic content.
- **Indirect Costs (up to € 7.125)**

When subcontracting, beneficiaries must comply with the Horizon Europe procurement rules, particularly the principles of fair competition, equal treatment and avoidance of conflicts of interest.

4.1. Financial Sustainability

The selected partner will contribute directly to financial sustainability by actively supporting the co-writing of funding bids, including drafting key sections, shaping the proposal narrative, and strengthening the overall quality and competitiveness of submissions to relevant funding opportunities.

5. Call Timeline and Application

5.1 Timeline

The standstill period is a set time after funding selection for appeals, final administrative checks, and compliance in the award process. The project cannot start before this period. The standstill period of 30 days applies to this call.

5.2 Application Submission

Applications must be submitted via [MyEITFood Portal](#), no later than the call deadline.

6. Eligibility, Evaluation and Selection Process

6.1. Admissibility

Please note that completing the following two steps is a mandatory prerequisite for submitting an application for EIT Food Calls.

- First, applicants must register their organisation on the [EU Funding & Tenders Portal](#) in order to obtain a unique nine-digit Participant Identification Code (PIC); if unsure whether a PIC already exists, organisations can verify their registration directly via the [EU Portal](#).
- Second, applicants must register, access and complete their submission through the platform MyEITFood.eu.

Only proposals complying with the following conditions will be considered eligible for further evaluation:

Applications must be submitted in English before the call deadline, submitted using the forms provided inside MyEITFood.eu, complete and contain all parts and mandatory annexes and supporting documents. For this call, a Budget must be uploaded following the template provided on the website.

Any proposals submitted after the deadline will be inadmissible.

6.2. Entities eligible to participate and eligibility for funding

This call is open to EIT Food partners: Strategic Partner or Delivery Partner, taking part in the Resilient Agriculture Think and Do Tank activities.

Consortium and mono-beneficiaries are eligible.

Any legal entity partner, regardless of its place of establishment, including legal entities from [non-associated third countries](#) is **eligible to participate**, provided that the conditions laid down in the Horizon Europe Regulation have been met (e.g. the entity is not under EU sanction, please refer to annex 2 and 3), along with any other conditions laid down in the specific call/topic.

For this call, a 'legal entity' means any legal person created and recognised as such under national law, EU law or international law, which has legal personality and which may, acting in its own name, exercise rights and be subject to obligations, or an entity without legal personality.

In accordance with the Horizon Europe Work Programme 2025¹, in order to be **eligible for funding**, the **applicant must be established in one of the eligible countries**, i.e.:

- the Member States of the European Union, including their outermost regions;
- the Overseas Countries and Territories (OCTs) linked to the Member States²;

- countries associated to Horizon Europe³;
- certain low- and middle-income countries⁴.
- Legal entities, which are established in countries not listed above will be eligible for funding if their participation is considered essential for implementing the action by the EIT.

Only proposals satisfying all the eligibility criteria shall pass on to the selection and evaluation stages.

Please see Annex 1 for exclusion criteria.

6.2 Evaluation Process

All submitted applications will undergo an eligibility check and evaluation to determine their feasibility and suitability for funding opportunity.

During the eligibility check, if EIT Food identifies obvious or technical errors in a proposal, applicant will have the opportunity to correct or resubmit their proposal within three (3) calendar days following the call submission deadline. Such errors may include system malfunctions, typos, or missing supporting documents.

The correction window is intended to ensure that these issues do not unduly affect the evaluation of otherwise eligible proposals. Please note that this opportunity is strictly limited to rectifying technical errors and does not permit substantive modifications to the proposal content.

The evaluation will be conducted by 1 external evaluator and 1 internal evaluator, based on the criteria below. External evaluators score the award criteria Excellence, Impact and Quality and Efficiency of Implementation. Internal evaluators only score KIC Portfolio Strategic Fit. The internal evaluation score does not outweigh the external assessment.

All external evaluators have been selected in an open and transparent process. All evaluators, both internal and external, are trained extensively on the European Union's Code of Conduct for Evaluators, namely on the importance of transparency, fair treatment of all applicants, confidentiality and how to avoid conflict of interest. Evaluators must contractually agree to recuse themselves in the event of a conflict of interest.

Experts are obliged to use Horizon Dashboard during the assessment and provide evidenced justification on the assessment of budgets.

6.2.1. Evaluation Criteria

The following criteria and weighting will be used in the assessment:

Each evaluation sub-criterion will be scored from 1 to 5 using the following scoring system.

The quality threshold for selection is a total weighted score of 3.5. The top highest-scoring applications will be selected.

Score		Description
1	Poor	The criterion is inadequately addressed, or there are serious inherent weaknesses
2	Fair	Application broadly addresses the criterion but there are significant weaknesses
3	Good	Application addresses the criterion well, but a number of shortcomings are present
4	Very good	Application addresses the criterion very well, but a small number of shortcomings are present

5	Excellent	Application successfully addresses all relevant aspects of the criterion. Any shortcomings are minor.
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Following the award decision, all applicants will be informed of the result in writing via email. All applicants shall receive their assessment, in the format of evaluation summary report, including their score. A reduced lump-sum amount may be communicated as part of the evaluation result.

The recipients of EIT Funding must take all measures to promote equal opportunities between men and women in the implementation of the action and, where applicable, in line with the gender equality plan. They must aim, to the extent possible, for a gender balance at all levels of personnel assigned to the action, including at supervisory and managerial level.

6.3 Appeal on Evaluation Results

Applicants can submit an appeal within 15 days of receiving their result, if:

- The evaluation of their proposal has not been carried out in accordance with the procedures set out in this document.

7. Administrative Items

7.1 Onboarding

Entities that have never been part of projects funded by the EIT Food and that do not have a PIC validated by the Research Executive Agency (REA) of the European Commission will be subject to a PIC validation process managed by the EIT Community Onboarding Service. All validated entities will proceed with the signature of legal agreements with EIT Food.

As part of the onboarding process, selected entities must:

- Sign and submit the Declaration of Size.
- Sign and submit the Financial Information Form.
- Register on EIT Food grants management platform.

Additionally, EIT Food reserves the right to request the EIT Community Onboarding Service a Financial Assessment Capacity to check the financial capacity of any entity of a selected proposal. In such case, EIT Food may require:

- an enhanced financial responsibility regime, i.e. joint and several liability for all subgrantees or joint and several liabilities of Affiliated Entities if any
- prefinancing paid in instalments (multiple/additional prefinancing)
- (one or more) prefinancing guarantees

or

- propose no prefinancing or
- request that the entity be replaced or, if needed, might reject the entire proposal

In other words, if the assessment results are not satisfactory, the EIT Food might reject the participation of this entity and will then check whether the proposal is still eligible.

7.2 EIT Food Legal Framework & Legal Documents to be signed

Selected applicants will receive a second communication with instructions regarding the completion of the following documents, as well as agreeing to EIT Food's conflict of interest policy:

1. Lump sum agreement

Any other legal agreements to make this grant eligible.

7.3 Payment Schedule

The total lump sum contribution will be disbursed in instalments and is conditional upon the delivery of the project deliverables mentioned above. Each deliverable is associated with proportional cost allocation and deduction rate. In cases where deliverables are not completed or only partially fulfilled, a deduction will be applied up to the amount associated with the incomplete deliverable.

To prove that the activity has been successfully implemented, the following compulsory deliverables and KPIs must be submitted and approved.

Please note: the amount and timing of funding is dependent on the dispersal of funds to EIT Food from the EIT.

7.4 Monitoring

The project will be monitored and may be audited. All Activities selected for funding undergo continuous monitoring by EIT Food to ensure effective progress and implementation in accordance with the Project Agreement.

EIT Food may request reporting of actual costs incurred with the subgrant, as well as regular reporting of KPIs and deliverables, together with the supporting documentation. The monitoring process may result in an amendment to the Activity workplan and/or budget.

In the case of under-performance, significant delay of implementation, misconduct, misalignment with the project specifications in the grant management system or any other reason jeopardizing the

timely implementation of the Activity identified during the monitoring process, EIT Food reserves the right to discontinue or restructure the funding of the Activity at any point during the Activity duration.

A formal ex-post impact assessment within at least five years of the end of the activity and its outputs is required for each activity, including those implemented by third parties.

ANNEX 1 – Exclusion Criteria

Please Note:

2. [According to EU policies and measures](#), Russian and Belarus entities will not be authorised to participate in any new grant under the EU Research and Innovation programmes. This ban applies not only to their potential participation as beneficiaries, but to their potential participation in any kind of role: beneficiaries, linked third parties/affiliated entities, subcontractors, in-kind contributors, international partners/associated partners, and third parties receiving financial support. Find the full statement from the European Commission [here](#).

3. Pursuant to Article 2 (2) of the [Decision 2022/2506](#) of 15 December 2022 on measures for the protection of the Union budget against breaches of the principles of the rule of law in Hungary *where the Commission implements the Union budget in direct or indirect management pursuant to of Article 62(1) points (a) and (c), of Regulation (EU, Euratom) 2018/1046*, **no legal commitments shall be entered into with any public interest trust established on the basis of the Hungarian Act IX of 2021 or any entity maintained by such a public interest trust**. This prohibition applies to financial support to third parties (sub-grants and prizes), hence the proposal of any entity or group of entities where a Participant is included in the list of public interest trusts shall be considered as not eligible.

4. Applicants will be deemed ineligible if:

a. bankrupt, subject to insolvency or winding-up procedures, where its assets are being administered by a liquidator or by a court, where it is in an arrangement with creditors, where its business Activities are suspended, or where it is in any analogous situation arising from a similar procedure provided for under national laws or regulations;

b. it has been established by a final judgment or a final administrative decision that the organisation is in breach of its obligations relating to the payment of taxes or social security contributions in accordance with the applicable law;

- c. it has been established by a final judgment or a final administrative decision that the organisation is guilty of grave professional misconduct by having violated applicable laws or regulations or ethical standards of the profession to which the organisation belongs, or by having engaged in any wrongful conduct which has an impact on its professional credibility where such conduct denotes a wrongful intent or gross negligence;
- d. is found to be attempting to influence the decision-making process of the call during the process;
- e. attempting to obtain confidential information that may confer upon its undue advantages in the call process;
- f. it has been established by a final judgment that the organisation is guilty of fraud, corruption or money laundering.
